Social Media Trending

Don'ts

- Reuse the same password on multiple accounts.
- Post personal details about yourself or your family..
- Sign into your apps from your social media accounts.
- Click on links from sources you don't know.
- Post company proprietary information or photos on social media without permission.
- Provide answers to all those quizzes your friends are doing.
- Use Like or Favorites for your bank, credit union, or credit card company.
- Accept a Friend request from anyone you don't know.

Dos:

- Check and adjust the security and privacy settings of each site to control who can see your profile and what you post.
- Use Multi-Factor Authentication whenever available.
- Check out your accounts after logging out, or review your public profile view to see what others may be able to see.
- Read the site's Privacy Policy and Terms of Use – knowledge is power.
- Remember, what you post online stays online, so think before you post!
- And some oldies but goodies keep security and OS software current and use strong passwords.

What should you always keep private and never post?

- Home address
- Personal phone numbers
- Birth date
- Current location
- Dates when you're going out of town
- Company or employee information without approval
